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A MESSAGE FROM THE REGIONAL ADMINISTRATOR

"It's been almost 45 years since the Fair Housing Act became law, but every day there are individuals and families in this country who experience housing discrimination. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and its Fair Housing Assistance Program partner agencies receive almost 10,000 complaints each year alleging some form of discrimination. And, there are many other instances of discrimination that go unreported," stated John Trasviña, HUD Assistant Secretary for Fair Housing and Equal Opportunity, in his opening remarks at an event announcing a recent fair housing settlement in Virginia.

The case came to HUD's attention when a Hispanic woman filed a complaint alleging that Virginia Realty, a property management company that manages over 500 rental units throughout Virginia Beach and Norfolk, refused to provide her a rental application because she could not speak English well and refused the translation assistance of the bilingual person she brought with her. Based on her experience, HUD launched a Secretary-initiated Investigation to determine whether the alleged discrimination was systemic. In the course of the investigation, HUD discovered that Virginia Realty had a written policy expressly requiring all prospective tenants to be able to communicate with management staff in English without assistance from others, and to complete rental applications only while they were in the management office.

As a result of HUD's investigation, Virginia Realty entered into two agreements: one with the individual who brought the initial complaint and the other with HUD. Under the first agreement, Virginia Realty will pay the prospective tenant \$7,500. Under the second agreement, the company will donate \$25,000 each to the Piedmont Housing Alliance, Hampton Roads Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, and Nueva Vida (New Life) Outreach International Church to support fair housing initiatives. In addition, Virginia Realty will adopt a non-discrimination policy, which it will distribute to current residents and prospective tenants; adopt a plan to more effectively serve Limited English Proficient residents and prospective tenants by providing translation and interpretation services; and require its employees to undergo fair housing training.



On January 23 at the Richmond Field Office, nearly 50 fair housing advocates and HUD staffers joined Asst. Sec. Trasviña, FHEO Regional Director Melody Taylor-Blancher, Field Office Director Carrie Schmidt and me to announce the non-profit settlement awards. Hampton Roads' Olga Torres and Jaime Baron are pictured with us receiving their ceremonial check.

Hampton Roads will use their \$25,000 donation to fund Hispanic housing-related outreach by hosting educational workshops, working with local Hispanic radio broadcasters and newspaper reporters and their bilingual website (hrhcc.org) to feature stories focusing on renters' rights. They also plan to distribute informational handouts at upcoming community events.



Piedmont Housing Alliance (PHA) will use the \$25,000 donation to support housing-related outreach and services to the Latino/Hispanic population through group education sessions, one-on-one housing and financial counseling, fair housing education and advocacy, and the Latino Outreach Initiative *Creciendo Juntos*. Specifically, PHA will serve Spanish-speaking housing counseling clients with a bilingual certified housing counselor and a free Spanish homebuyer's class; provide targeted outreach on fair housing rights to the Latino community, with Spanish flyers and booklets, presentations, public awareness advertisements, and complaint forms, as well

In his remarks, Nueva Vida (New Life) Outreach International Church's Pastor Carlos Rivera noted, "We are grateful for the funds being donated. They will be used to continue our programs, outreaches, and to help inform and connect the Latino community with the housing resources they need. Language should never be a barrier that hinders anyone from obtaining a safe place to live and raise their families."

The housing related education activities of each of these nonprofits will do much to create greater housing opportunities throughout the state of Virginian for Latino families in inclusive communities where everyone is treated fairly.

The Notice on Appeals for the FY2012 CoC Program Competition is now posted on the HUD Homeless Resources Exchange. This Notice provides guidance to Continuums of Care (CoCs) and Project Applicants that applied through the FY 2012 CoC Program Competition regarding the information that must be submitted to HUD in order to appeal one of the following decisions: Project applicant believes that it was denied the right to participate in the CoC planning process in a reasonable manner; Applicant was denied CoC Program funds by HUD, or requested more funds than HUD awarded or Eligible applicant whose jurisdiction refused to sign the Consolidated Plan certification for the project. HUD strongly encourages applicants

that believe they fall under one of the above categories to read the Notice in its entirety, provide evidence that supports the appeal request, and clearly state the applicant's claim in a timely manner based on the deadlines highlighted in the Notice.

The National Council on Aging has announced the availability of the **2013 version of Use Your Home to Stay at Home**TM, the official reverse mortgage consumer booklet approved by HUD. Use Your Home to Stay at HomeTM is a user-friendly guide to help older homeowners understand the pros and cons of a reverse mortgage. Click here to download a copy.

A new guide explains how to combine HOME Investment Partnership funds (HOME) and Low Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC). Published by HUD, **HOME and the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit Guidebook** addresses compliance with the requirements of both programs. Click here for the guidebook.

In its <u>Statement of Regulatory Priorities for FY13</u>, HUD says it plans to issue a proposed rule in April changing how it administers its obligation to affirmatively further fair housing. It will replace the existing analysis of impediments requirement with a fair housing assessment and planning process, hoping to create a more direct link between fair housing and Consolidated Plans or Public Housing Authority Plans. The Department of Health and Human Services has <u>adjusted its poverty guidelines</u> to account for a 2.1% increase in the cost of living from 2011 to 2012. For programs that use this benchmark, the 2013 poverty line for a family of four in the continental U.S. is \$23,550.

HUD Joins Nemours to Host "Ensuring Healthy Homes and Reducing Asthma Triggers for Children"

Every day a young child has an asthma attack and is taken to the Emergency Room. The mother has to take off work, and the child misses school. This cycle happens several times each year. This scenario is all too common in Delaware—ranked sixth in the nation for its asthma rates. Nemours Health and Prevention Services and HUD are joining hands to help reduce the incidence of asthma in children in the First

State. The two hosted a roundtable, Ensuring Healthy Homes and Reducing Asthma Triggers for Children, on Jan. 31. Regional Administrator Jane C.W. Vincent served as one of the panelists and helped to connect the dots between housing and health for an audience of 50 people. Vincent explained, "Although we are still studying the exact linkages between health and housing we have known for a long time that housing conditions impact resident health." Bill Leitzinger, Delaware's Administrator for the Office of Healthy Environments, pictured (left) with HUD's Ed Thomas and Maria Bynum, spoke about the First State's nationally-recognized Healthy Homes initiative. District of Columbia's DHCD Announces Pre-Solicitation and Capacity Building Workshop Series

The Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) will host a Pre-Solicitation and Capacity Building Workshop Series to increase awareness of available local and federal funding sources and to explore potential partnership opportunities for non-profit and for profit organizations. The workshops, scheduled for Feb. 27 and March 27, will begin at 11 a.m. and will be held at the Town Hall Education Arts Recreation Campus, 1901 Mississippi Avenue SE. In April 2013, DHCD will publish a Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for funding under the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, HOME Investment Partnership (HOME), Housing Production Trust Fund (HPTF) program, 9% Low Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC), and Department of Mental Health (DMH) funds administered by the department. The Fiscal Year 2014 NOFA will also involve agencies such as the DC Housing Finance Agency (DCHFA), DC Housing Authority (DCHA), DC Department of Human Services (DHS), along with DHCD and DMH to provide funding for Permanent Supportive Housing and related services. Governor Martin O'Malley is allocating \$25 million in his FY2014 capital budget for Rental Housing Works, the initiative he launched last year to create jobs and address Maryland's critical shortage of affordable rental housing for working families, senior citizens and individuals with special needs. Wells Fargo to provide \$4.5M in assistance for Baltimore homebuyers Mayor Stephanie Rawlings-Blake and partners Wells Fargo & Company, NeighborWorks America, and Neighborhood Housing Services of Baltimore announced a \$4.5 million public-private partnership to provide grants to new homebuyers. Wells Fargo's CityLIFT program will provide \$15,000 in down payment assistance grants to new Baltimore homebuyers. Baltimore is one of 20 cities that will benefit from a total of \$170 million Wells Fargo has committed to support sustainable housing in cities affected by the economic downturn. In the first phase of the CityLIFT program, prospective homebuyers must meet income guidelines, complete a homebuyer education course, and have a signed contract to purchase a home in

Baltimore to qualify for the \$15,000 down payment assistance grants. The remaining \$3.5 million in grants will be made available to eligible homebuyers in April 2013 during the second phase of the program. No purchase of sale contract will be required to apply. However, homeowners must be mortgage-ready, be able to complete an 8-hour homebuyer education class, and close on a home within 90 days. "This is a wonderful partnership opportunity that will help Baltimore rebound from the downturn in the housing market and provide Baltimore residents with new opportunities to help make buying a home economically feasible," said Baltimore Housing Commissioner Paul Graziano. The Baltimore CityLIFT program was developed in connection with a 2012 settlement with the City of Baltimore and a collaboration of Wells Fargo Bank N.A. and NeighborWorks America. Passive House Design Accelerates Affordability

On Dec. 12, community leaders and stakeholders gathered at McKeesport Downtown Housing to celebrate the construction of the first passive house design for multifamily housing in the United States. The development will house those at risk for homelessness. The term passive house (Passivhaus in German) refers to a rigorous, voluntary standard of constructing airtight buildings that need little to no outside heat or cooling sources to keep comfortable. The energy efficient design eliminates the need for a central boiler and chiller which saves not only on the capital cost of this equipment, but the maintenance and repair costs over the years. The 84-unit

File Federal and State Tax Returns for free at a VITA Site

Families with household income below \$51,000 are eligible for free tax preparation and may be eligible for an earned income tax credit of up to \$5,891—even if no taxes are owed. When you come to a VITA site, you MUST bring: a Picture ID, social security card for you, your spouse and ALL dependents, all W2's, 1099 forms and any other tax information you have received. There are no exceptions to these requirements.
