Summary Statement

An appropriation of \$249 million is proposed for Housing for Persons with Disabilities for fiscal year 2005. Included in this amount is an estimated \$2 million to renew expiring Project Rental Assistance Contracts (PRAC) under the Disabled program; \$50 million for renewal of the mainstream vouchers under the disabled program: and not less than \$75 thousand for transfer to the Working Capital Fund for information technology in fiscal year 2005. In addition, the total funding proposed for the disabled, up to 25 percent of the funds made available for tenant-based assistance to provide for program flexibility and more choice in housing for low-income persons with disabilities.

Proposed Actions

For fiscal year 2005, the Department is proposing \$147 million for the Housing for Persons with Disabilities program which was authorized by Section 811 of the Cranston-Gonzalez National Affordable Housing Act to provide eligible non-profit organizations with capital advances and rental assistance to provide housing for disabled individuals. The capital advances will be used to finance the acquisition, acquisition with rehabilitation, construction, reconstruction, or rehabilitation of housing intended for use for persons with disabilities. Housing for Persons with Disabilities is designed to meet the special physical needs of disabled individuals and to accommodate the provision of supportive services. In fiscal year 2005, the Administration proposes reforms to this account to permit greater local flexibility in meeting the housing needs of the disabled. The Administration continues the commitment made in 2003 to end chronic homelessness within a decade through a new Samaritan Initiative. The chronically homeless are a subpopulation of perhaps 150,000 who often have an addiction or suffer from a disabling physical or mental condition. They are homeless for extended periods or experience multiple episodes of homelessness. Research indicates that although these individuals may comprise less than 10 percent of the homeless population, they consume more than one-half of all homeless services because their needs are not comprehensively addressed.

Proposed Actions

The Department is proposing \$2 million for the renewal of Project Rental Assistance Contracts (PRAC). These funds are used to cover the difference between what the residents pay for rent (based on 30 percent of their adjusted income) and the HUD-approved expense to operate the project. After the initial 5-year funding agreement, PRAC contracts are renewed for 1-year terms.

Proposed Actions

The Department is proposing \$49 million for mainstream vouchers. Up to 25 percent of funding for new grants for supportive housing for persons with disabilities will be made available in the form of tenant-based rental assistance vouchers to increase program flexibility. The assistance will allow disabled renters to search for and rent a standard unit in the private market. This is known as "mainstreaming" recipients into the housing market.

Explanation of Indicators

Nearly two million households headed by an elderly individual or a person with a disability receive HUD rental assistance that provides them with the opportunity to afford a decent place to live and often helps them to live independent lives. The Housing for Persons with Disabilities program continues to enable persons with disabilities to live in mainstream environments. These indicators

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will measure the success of this program by examining whether service-enriched housing increases the satisfaction of persons with disabilities with their units, developments, and neighborhoods.

The 2005 President's budget includes proposed changes in the appropriation language listed and explained below. New language is italicized and underlined, and language proposed for deletion is bracketed.

For capital advance contracts, including amendments to capital advance contracts, for supportive housing for persons with disabilities, as authorized by section 811 of the Cranston-Gonzalez National Affordable Housing Act, for project rental assistance for supportive housing for persons with disabilities under section 811(d)(2) of such Act, including amendments to contracts for such assistance and renewal of expiring contracts for such assistance for up to a 1-year term, and for supportive services associated with the housing for persons with disabilities as authorized by section 811(b)(1) of such Act, and for tenant-based rental assistance contracts entered into pursuant to section 811 of such Act, [\$250,570,000] \$248,700,000, plus recaptures and cancelled commitments to remain available until September 30, [2006] 2008: Provided, That no less than [\$470,000] \$75,000 shall be transferred to the Working Capital Fund for the development of and modifications to information technology systems which serve programs or activities under ''Housing programs'' or ''Federal Housing Administration'': Provided further, That of the amount provided under this heading, other than amounts for renewal of expiring project-based or tenant-based rental assistance contracts, the Secretary may designate up to 25 percent for tenant-based rental assistance, as authorized by section 811 of such Act, (which assistance is five years in duration): Provided further, That the Secretary may waive the provisions of section 811 governing the terms and conditions of project rental assistance and tenant-based assistance, except that the initial contract term for such assistance shall not exceed five years in duration: Provided further, That all balances outstanding, as of September 30, [2003] 2004, for capital advances, including amendments to capital advances, for supportive housing for persons with disabilities, as authorized by section 811, for project rental assistance for supportive housing for persons with disabilities, as authorized under section 811(d)(2), including amendments to con-tracts for such assistance and renewal of expiring contracts for such assistance, and for supportive services associated with the housing for persons with disabilities as authorized by section 811(b)(1), shall be transferred to and merged with the amounts for these purposes under this heading.
