

The Minneapolis Promise Zone encompasses much of North Minneapolis including nine neighborhoods and 13 census tracts. One quarter of the population age 25 or older does not possess a high school degree/GED and only 39% of students graduated high school on time in 2014. The Promise Zone has alarmingly high unemployment, gun violence, housing blight, and poor educational outcomes.



Despite deep and persistent needs, the Minneapolis Promise Zone is a community with transformative aspirations. The partners have adopted the following six goals to improve the quality of life and accelerate revitalization.

- Reduce Racial Inequities
- Create Jobs
- Increase Economic Activity
- Reduce Serious And Violent Crime
- Improve Educational Outcomes
- Support Stable Housing For All
