# THE COMMON APP

## The Common Application for College:



Have you ever been adjudicated guilty or convicted of a misdemeanor or felony?

Note that you are not required to answer “yes” to this question, or provide an explanation if the criminal adjudication or conviction has been expunged, sealed, annulled, pardoned, destroyed, erased, impounded or otherwise required by law or ordered by a court to be kept confidential.

# FAFSA

## Can I get federal financial aid if I have a juvenile record?

The FAFSA asks whether you have been convicted of a drug charge while receiving federal student loans. If you only have juvenile adjudications, you can answer “No” to this question — even if your juvenile record includes a drug-related offense — because this question is asking about adult convictions, not juvenile adjudications. And if you have never received federal student aid before, you can also answer “No” because the question is asking if you were convicted while receiving federal financial aid.
